The findings presented in "Peace and War in the 21st Century" come from a five year study: Preparing for Peace – By Asking the Experts to Analyse War.

In 2,000 Nobel Prize Winner, Joseph Rotblat, accepted an invitation from members of the Religious Society of Friends – better known as Quakers – in Westmorland, to speak about the issues of war & peace.

A small number of Friends inspired by what they heard began what they envisaged as a three to four year enquiry to explore the key issues of war & peace in the new century through the minds of international experts.

Well attended public meetings were addressed by experts who were invited to analyse the effectiveness of war as a tool of modern diplomacy. Speakers included a military General & other non-Quaker speakers.

Following this enquiry, a book based upon the lectures (entitled "Preparing for Peace – by asking the experts to analyse war") was sent to every member of the UN General Assembly in 2005 & then distributed internationally. A web site <u>www.preparingforpeace.org</u> records all contributions made.

The Preparing for Peace group considers that war in the 21st century does not work because it cannot work. Globalisation & the application of science & technology to the weapons of war have made war unworkable, they argue.

Although a simple idea, its implications & consequences are at once daunting & complex. Nonetheless it seems to express the aspirations of many people world-wide. The purpose now is to explore those consequences with special emphasis on the nature of Civil Society in the 21st century & the prime role of politicians in designing & implementing peaceful solutions to disputes between nations. The group is analysing the changing & often helpful nature of the military's own analysis of war as a largely failed tool of diplomacy.

Additionally, the role of the UN in terms of peace-making & peace keeping has been addressed. Of particular interest has been the investigation of the true human, economic & environmental costs of modern war. The validity of the theories of "Just War" has been scrutinised & found wanting.
